Course Description: This 5-day, 40 hour program has been designed by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board to provide students with the required training in use of police personnel within the school setting in accordance with SB 2925 (PA 100-984). SROs must be police officers of law enforcement agencies who are to serve within a school setting pursuant to a memorandum of understanding between the employing law enforcement agency and a school district within the agency's jurisdiction. Any officer serving in this role as of January 1, 2021 must have a special certification issued by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board ("Board"). Such officers must have attended a special training, or attained a waiver by the Board, before they can serve in this role. **To be eligible for this special certificate, a full-time Illinois law enforcement officer must have been actively employed in a law enforcement position within the state for at least three years (five years for part-time officers) before enrolling in the course or requesting a waiver. Each such officer must also be of sound character, free of disciplinary concerns, and open to working with minors.**

Topics Discussed:

Overview of juvenile law, Juvenile Court Act, role of the juvenile officer, special juvenile considerations, due process for juveniles, detention of juveniles, interrogating juvenile suspects, interviewing juvenile witnesses, rights of parents, SRO introduction, roles of SRO, school structure and hierarchy, school law, adolescent development/teen brain, communication, developing relationships among diverse students, special considerations and disabilities, criminal activity, law enforcement actions in school, ethical concerns, school design and safety, introduction to school threat response, school threat response case studies, role of SRO during a threat, recognizing an active threat, tactical

maneuvering on school grounds, solo vs. group response tactics, clearing of school classrooms, identification and response to threat, post event, scenario trainings.

Instructors: This course will be taught by a team of Instructors. Lead Instructor, Danielle Butts is the Founder and Executive Director of All Our Children's Advocacy Center. She has been a Forensic Interviewer for 20 years and conducted over 4,000 interviews. Danielle is a member of the Cook County Child Abuse Advisory Board and the Children's Advocacy Center of Illinois Legislative Committee. She has been a law enforcement instructor for over 15 years and currently teaches; Interviewing Children, Juvenile Investigations, Sexual Assault and SRO.

Course Description: Forfeitures can be a valuable tool to law enforcement in the following areas: improving public safety by forfeiting the DUI and suspended driver's car, taking away expensive vehicles and other assets from drug dealers, seizing bank accounts of criminals who commit check/credit card fraud and other financial crimes, forfeiting real property paid for with proceeds of mortgage fraud or any other crime where money is derived.

This course will provide law enforcement officers an understanding of forfeiture law in Illinois and how to successfully incorporate the forfeiture component into criminal investigations and prosecutions. After reviewing applicable statutes, the course will cover practical implementation of those statutes through real world examples. Additionally, techniques for locating assets and building financial cases will be discussed. This course will be useful for patrol officers; officers in specialized units such as narcotics, gangs or financial crimes; command staff; and agency policymakers. For those individuals who have already attended a forfeiture training, this course will broaden your ability to implement forfeiture law into your investigations and capture previously untouched assets of criminal enterprises.

Some of the topics include:

- Statutory basis for forfeiture in Illinois based on the Controlled Substances Act, The Money Laundering Act, The Gang Act, Article 36, and miscellaneous statutes
- Locating and discovering hidden assets and co-conspirators
- Putting together the forfeiture case simultaneous to the criminal case
- Search warrant execution – how to build a forfeiture case during a search warrant
- Techniques and tips for building a financial crimes case
- Use of forfeited property

Instructor: Assistant State's Attorney Dant Foulk of the Will County State's Attorney's Office, manages the Forfeiture Unit and serves in the office's Financial Crimes Prosecution Unit. In the Forfeiture Unit, Dant specializes in identifying, locating, seizing and forfeiting illegally gained proceeds from narcotics and money laundering activities and other financial crimes. In the Financial Crimes Unit, he coordinates the long-term investigations of complex financial crimes, including credit card and check fraud rings, identity theft conspiracies and organized money laundering activities.

Course Description: This course uses tactical breath work, physical drills, and cognitive behavioral therapy resulting in optimal functioning of the entire psychophysiological system. This includes increasing mental toughness, enhancing tactical skills, preventing injury, self-deescalation, regulating the nervous system and more. The result of consistent training in YFFR Protocol will not only lead to better performance and stress management but an increase in mindful responses versus emotional reactions with interpersonal communication.

This course will introduce the trainee to the basic concepts of yoga, mindfulness, and resilience, functions of the brain and nervous system, as well as the principles of the YFFR Protocol that make it job-specific and culturally informed. Attendees will learn techniques to use right away along with resources to continue their training.

Course Objectives:

1. Explain yoga, its original intent, and address misconceptions.
2. Formulate the steps needed to practice mindfulness.
3. Outline the 3 Principles of Resilience Training.
4. Assess how a career in Law Enforcement can affect the mind, body, and nervous system.
5. Categorize the basic functions of the nervous system and stress response.
6. Conclude the missing skill set in Law Enforcement training.
7. Illustrate how yoga can train the Law Enforcement Officer to perform at his/her highest level of functioning for tactical performance and career longevity.
8. Compare how the YFFR Protocol differs from community yoga in western cultures.
9. Deduce how YFFR can be added into current Law Enforcement Training Standards.
10. Learn and practice the foundational techniques of YFFR protocol.
11. Distinguish which basic YFFR techniques can train the entire system to process stress effectively, build resilience actively, and enhance performance tactically.
12. Adopt YFFR techniques for improving body mechanics, neuromuscular efficiency, awkward shooting positions, breath control, and proprioception for tactical performance.
13. Decide when and how to use and adapt YFFR techniques for optimal value.
14. Understand how to implement YFFR as a consistent training tool personally or for your department.

Officers should wear clothing that they would normally wear during defensive tactics training, as there will be practical applications to the classroom instructions. This will take place on defensive tactics mats. Watch the attached videos for further:

Course Description: This forty-hour course is specifically designed for experienced uniformed patrol personnel selected to serve as Field Training Officers with probationary employees. The course emphasizes the FTO's role in assisting probationers certify for solo patrol operations by applying the knowledge and skills acquired during Basic Police Training/Certification and using them according to agency policy, procedures and community service delivery standards. The instruction highlights two essential Field Training and Evaluation Process skills: 1) the ability to examine and objectively document the probationer's job behaviors using the 2009 revised non-numerical/behaviorally anchored standardized assessment guidelines and, 2) analyzing the probationer's training needs and using proper instructional techniques for corrective action. The instruction presentation will focus upon discussion as well as hands-on application of the course materials in small group and individual/student exercises. Students will be required to complete out- of-classroom reading assignments from the course text and workbook, *Breaking Routine™: Field Training Officer*.

The course content will include:

- What every FTO really needs to know about the operational structure of the Field Training & Evaluation Process.
- The Instructional Relay Race: Taking over where Basic Police Training/Certification left off.
 - Inventorying the probationer's current knowledge and skill proficiencies.
- Selection and use of on-the-job instructional techniques: finding the best tools to meet the challenge.
- Utilization of legally defensible, non-numerical standardized evaluation guidelines.
- Objectively documenting probationer performance.
- Documenting the extent of training and coaching without becoming a best-selling author.

Course Description: This 24-Hour Elderly Service Officer Training program is an intensive, 24-hour course designed to educate and sensitize police officers to issues that affect senior citizens. Offered by the Illinois Attorney General's office, the program teaches law enforcement officials to become more aware of the needs and problems of the senior community and to play a more active role in preventing and investigating crimes against older people.

COURSE OVERVIEW: This program will provide law enforcement personnel with the skills and knowledge needed to investigate crimes against senior citizens. Through a combination of lecture and practical exercises, students will learn to do the following:

- Conduct risk assessments and recognize signs of elder abuse and emotional abuse:
 - Understand the dynamic of domestic violence as it extends to partners and adult children as caregivers.
 - Identify potential safety issues concerning Dementia or Alzheimer's disease.
 - Identify safety concerns as to mobility, vision, auditory impairments, and mental health crisis.
 - Understand best practices and the law and legal updates as they apply to senior victims.
 - Understand charging and prosecuting Elder Abuse and Financial Crimes.
- Report elder abuse in accordance with mandatory reporting laws.

- Investigate crimes commonly committed against seniors, including home repair fraud, ruse entries and residential burglaries, theft, elder abuse and exploitation, and cons such as foreign lotteries, grandparent scams, fraudulent telemarketing, etc.
- Effectively and compassionately communicate with the aging population:
 - Best practices for communicating with special victim populations (people who are homeless, people with disabilities, LGBTQ+ population and people who identify differently, people who are apprehensive of police motives and biases) (CONTINUED)
 - Understand generational differences and cultural differences.
 - Identifying bias and understanding how bias and implicit bias can interrupt effective delivery of compassionate services.
 - Deliver trauma informed care to elderly victims of crime (CONTINUED)
- Connect seniors with resources available in the community
- Present educational seminars on crime and scam prevention for senior groups in the community
- Manage a senior emergency identification bracelet program
- Address hoarding and self-neglect.
 - Address the safety concerns and code violations while being aware of the mental health crisis or challenges the senior may be facing.
- Improve awareness of issues in residential care settings
- Collaborate with adult protective services and other senior service agencies
- Understand issues surrounding Dementia and Alzheimer's disease:
- Represent the police department on multidisciplinary elder fatality review teams that investigate elder abuse and neglect
- Understand Disability Law as it relates to Seniors
 - Overview of SOS services and placards with updates as to the vehicle code.
 - Overview of the law and the changes in the law as they relate to people with disabilities and the use of service animals.
- Connect qualifying seniors to Veteran's resources
 - An overview of the law and the rights senior veterans have.
- Implement Silver Search

Instructors will be from the Illinois Attorney General's Office, Secretary of State Police, and various Law Enforcement Agencies specializing in Elder Abuse/Financial Exploitation of the Elderly, and Victim Rights Advocates.

Course Description: The two-day WZ Seminar on Tactical Field Interviewing is designed to teach and reinforce the sound fundamentals of the field interviewing process for the patrol officer, field investigator, detective, police officer, special agent, or other law enforcement professional. - **Counter-Terrorism Interdiction Questioning:** Questioning techniques that can be utilized during a tactical interview of a potential terrorist suspect. Baseline and behavior-provoking questions discussed.
- **Interpretation of Verbal and Physical Behavior:** The evaluation of verbal and physical behavior as they relate to identifying anomalies and the pursuit of the truth will be discussed in depth.

Course Description:

Recent events have placed police officers and the public they serve in the national spotlight in the news, on the internet, and in Federal and local court. These events usually start as encounters for minor traffic stops, petty ordinance violations, or disorderly conduct-based confrontations. Many of these non-arrest situations quickly escalate to physical, violent, and sometimes deadly force encounters. While the officers involved are acting properly and legally enforcing the laws they are sworn to uphold, day after judgments quickly become the focus.

This one-day seminar will help departments reduce citizen complaints based on perceived improper use of force incidents. Attendees will improve their verbal communication skills and recognize when an emotion-based rather than emotionally disability escalation is occurring. Officers will learn to explore alternative methods of safely and peacefully bringing a resolution to both the issue at hand and the reason for the encounter. This seminar will focus on everyday encounters with non-mentally impaired or disturbed individuals who are upset or agitated and may escalate the encounter based on anger issues and behavior. Officers will examine how to maintain scene and individual safety, and follow accepted personnel safety protocols. Participants will actively participate as both officers **and** subjects/offenders in some of the scenarios. This class is appropriate for CIT trained Officers, Patrol Officers, and Supervisors.

ATTENDEE COURSE GOALS:

- Learn the difference between confrontation and response/conversation.
- Learn how to use disarming and de-escalation phraseology with subjects.
- Learn what inflammatory phraseology is and how to avoid it.
- Understand the difference between deflecting and accusing during encounters.
- Identify how and when perception from a distance can be interpreted.
- Learn to identify physiological cues and tells of subjects escalating to a physical response.
- Understand how body chemistry works (endorphins, adrenalin and dopamine, etc.).
- Review how to reduce negative public perception during encounters.
- Learn how to secure a scene for responder and public safety during encounters.
- Learn how to avoid purposeful escalation and negative public perception.
- Recognize physical tells of cluster behavior in incident escalation.
- Identify situations which may relate to domestic terrorism activities.

Course Description:

Recent events have placed police officers and the public they serve in the national spotlight in the news, on the internet, and in Federal and local court. These events usually start as encounters for minor traffic stops, petty ordinance violations, or disorderly conduct-based confrontations. Many of these non-arrest situations quickly escalate to physical, violent, and sometimes deadly force encounters. While the officers involved are acting properly and legally enforcing the laws they are sworn to uphold, day after judgments quickly become the focus.

This one-day seminar will help departments reduce citizen complaints based on perceived improper use of force incidents. Attendees will improve their verbal communication skills and recognize when an emotion-based rather than emotionally disability escalation is occurring. Officers will learn to explore alternative methods of safely and peacefully bringing a resolution to both the issue at hand and the reason for the encounter. This seminar will focus on everyday encounters with non-mentally impaired or disturbed individuals who are upset or agitated and may escalate the encounter based on anger issues and behavior. Officers will examine how to maintain scene and individual safety, and follow accepted personnel safety protocols. Participants will actively participate as both officers **and** subjects/offenders in some of the scenarios. This class is appropriate for CIT trained Officers, Patrol Officers, and Supervisors.

ATTENDEE COURSE GOALS:

- Learn the difference between confrontation and response/conversation.
- Learn how to use disarming and de-escalation phraseology with subjects.
- Learn what inflammatory phraseology is and how to avoid it.
- Understand the difference between deflecting and accusing during encounters.
- Identify how and when perception from a distance can be interpreted.
- Learn to identify physiological cues and tells of subjects escalating to a physical response.
- Understand how body chemistry works (endorphins, adrenalin and dopamine, etc.).
- Review how to reduce negative public perception during encounters.
- Learn how to secure a scene for responder and public safety during encounters.
- Learn how to avoid purposeful escalation and negative public perception.
- Recognize physical tells of cluster behavior in incident escalation.
