Tactical Field Interviewing

Course Description: The two-day WZ Seminar on Tactical Field Interviewing is designed to teach and reinforce the sound fundamentals of the field interviewing process for the patrol officer, field investigator, detective, police officer, special agent, or other law enforcement professional. Course participants learn a broad range of cutting-edge methods and proprietary tools to conduct more effective interviews and interrogations in their terrorism-related investigations that will result in more actionable intelligence, quicker admissions and better statements.

The course is especially appropriate for those investigators tasked with the investigation of domestic or foreign terrorism and terrorist-related activities. Criminal activities traditionally investigated by law enforcement may have provided cover and funding for terrorist organization in the United States and abroad. Investigators conducting these inquiries will learn to apply interviewing techniques that most often will bring these cases to a successful conclusion.

Instruction includes a comprehensive overview of non-confrontational interviewing methods to overcome the resistance of a traditional criminal or terrorist operative. Attendees will learn to assess verbal and non-verbal behavior, offer rationalizations, handle denials, detect deception and evaluate truthfulness. This course will enhance communication, interview and interrogation skills for a more focused and successful investigation of terrorist activities.

TOPICS INCLUDE:

- **Interview vs. Interrogation** and the advantages and disadvantages during a field contact or crime scene investigation.
- **Legal Aspects of Tactical Field Interviews:** A review of the laws regarding criminal interview and interrogation, Miranda warnings, consent to search, and the development of an admission into a legally acceptable confession.
- **Counter-Terrorism Interdiction Questioning:** Questioning techniques that can be utilized during a tactical interview of a potential terrorist suspect. Baseline and behavior-provoking questions discussed.
- **Interpretation of Verbal and Physical Behavior:** The evaluation of verbal and physical behavior as they relate to identifying anomalies and the pursuit of the truth will be discussed in depth.
- **Cognitive Interviewing Techniques:** Techniques that can be utilized when interviewing a traumatized or a cooperating witness. Techniques in establishing rapport and the concept of Neurolinguistics.
- **Enticement Questions:** Behavior-provoking non-accusatory questions that can be asked to entice a suspect into changing his original story.

- **Reducing Resistance:** How to use rationalizations to reduce resistance during a field interview.
- **Obtaining the Admission:** How alternative & assumptive questions can be utilized to obtain a confession
- **Developing and Handling Informants:** How to develop and improve the officer's ability to utilize informants as a valuable resource.

Instructor: Keith Zupec, CFI, brings over 23 years of law enforcement experience to the seminars he conducts for Wicklander-Zulawski & Associates, Inc. (WZ). This 8-hour course, developed by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training & Standards Board, is meant to provide law enforcement officers with an awareness of mental health issues including a history of mental health systems, types of mental illness, signs and symptoms, common treatments & medications, and potential interactions law enforcement may have, on a regular basis, with these individuals, their families and service providers.

- Signs & symptoms of mental illness

- Suicide warning signs

Instructor: Lt. Troy Siewert has been with the Orland Park Police Department (OPPD) for over 28 years and holds a master's degree in criminal social justice from Lewis University. He is a certified CIT coordinator, CIT officer, crisis negotiator and Mental Health First Aid instructor as well as a CIT role play evaluator for the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board. Troy started the OPPD Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) in 2015 and has developed the program into what is now recognized as a standard for best practice. Solo Officer Response Rapid Deployment

This course complies with the guidelines of the following mandate(s): Use of Force

Course Description:

Rapid deployment/immediate action is the swift and immediate deployment of law enforcement resources to a life-threatening active threat situation. These situations require immediate action and the rapid deployment of law enforcement. Failure to act has catastrophic consequences resulting in death and/or great bodily harm to innocent people. These incidents may also necessitate the immediate and rapid deployment of personnel to contain and prevent the escape of an armed and dangerous offender or rescue a downed officer and/or civilian.

Course Objectives:

This course has been designed to train SRO's and patrol officers in the basic fundamentals and tactical skill sets of Solo Officer Active Threat response protocols. The focus of this program will be to provide officers with the knowledge, specialized tactical skill sets and strategic understanding when it is necessary to respond alone to an active threat situation. Officers will attend a short classroom presentation and then spend most of the class engaged in active threat scenario training. The class will culminate in several realistic force-on-force scenarios with live role players.

Topics to be addressed:

Individual movement • Individual room clearing tactics • Use-of-force and safety priorities • Equipment and identification requirements • Linking up with other first responders and integration of other personnel and agencies • Verbal skills • Deployment and firearms handling

COURSE PREREQUISITES:

- This course is open to all sworn police officers; ****priority will be given to SRO's****.
- This is not a beginner's course. Participants must have a working knowledge of basic conventional rapid deployment techniques and tactics.
- Course participants should be physically capable of operating in challenging crisis situations.
- Course participants will be required to jog, kneel and perform police tactical skills. If an officer is physically incapable of performing these basic tasks, please do not register them to attend.

THE COURSE REQUIRES EVERY ATTENDEE TO BE EQUIPPED WITH THE FOLLOWING:

- **Converted patrol rifle and pistol that shoot marking cartridges (converted pistols and AR15 drop in bolts are available for those that do not have their own).**
- **Officers must bring their own converted weapons, but they must be Simunition, Force-on-Force, or UTM ammunition capable.**
- **Air-Soft training pistols and rifles are also acceptable.**
- **Officers must have a minimum of 100 marking rounds (50 pistol / 50 rifle).**
- **Officers should also bring protective mask and neck protection if available.**
- **All participants must bring their own rifles.**
- **Food and drink in a cooler for breaks and lunches - students will eat on site.**

Course Description: This eight-hour course will be an open forum review of the primary enforcement sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Content includes the use of IVC violations for probable cause stops, bail bond procedures for multiple offense and out-of-state violators, and equipment and safety and enforcement issues. Attendees will participate in table-top exercises in the morning and afternoon sessions. These exercises will help officers understand the subtle differences in the subsections of offenses (e.g.: turning, U turns, sign violations). DWI Detection & Standard Field Sobriety Testing

(24-hour course)

This course complies with the guidelines of the following mandate(s): Const. Use of LE Authority | Civil Rights | Legal Updates

This three-day, 24-hour course is a State Certified program on the standardization of sobriety testing procedures. The latest testing methods will be demonstrated. Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus (HGN) techniques for improved probable cause standard for DUI arrests will be taught. This course will also cover the pharmacological differences between drug effects and alcohol effects on the body.

- ***This course utilizes live dosed individuals as opposed to videos, which greatly enhances the training.***

Course Description: The purpose of this course is to increase deterrence of DWI violations, and thereby reduce the number of crashes, deaths and injuries caused by impaired drivers. As a result of this training, participants will become significantly better able to:

- Understand enforcement's role in general DWI deterrence.
- Understand detection phases, clues and techniques.
- Understand requirements for organizing and presenting testimonial and documentary evidence in DWI cases.
- Recognize and interpret evidence of DWI violations.
- Administer and interpret Standardized Field Sobriety Tests.
- Describe DWI evidence clearly and convincingly in written reports and verbal testimony.
- Understand the tasks and decisions of DWI detection.
- Know and recognize typical vehicle maneuvers and human indicators symptomatic of DWI associated with initial observations.
- Know and recognize typical reinforcing maneuvers and indicators that come to light during the stopping sequence.
- Know and recognize typical sensory and other clues of alcohol and/or other drug impairment that may be seen during face-to-face contact with DWI suspects.
- Know and recognize typical behavioral clues of alcohol and/or other drug impairment that may be seen during the suspect's exit from the vehicle.
- Understand the role and relevance of psychophysical testing in pre-arrest screening of DWI suspects.
- Know and carry out appropriate administrative procedures for validated divided attention psychophysical tests.
- Know and carry out appropriate administrative procedures for the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test.
- Know and recognize typical clues of alcohol and/or other drug impairment that may be seen during administration of the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests.

Course Description: In the United States, a pedestrian or vehicle is struck by a train every three hours. Likewise, there is a train derailment every two hours.
