~~**Course Description:** This training will introduce officers to the use of Small Unmanned Aircraft Systems (sUAS), commonly called "drones", for both evidence collection and search operations. The course will cover all aspects of UAS operations, including preparations for the mandatory FAA Part 107 licensing. It will include information on the necessary waiver to fly in populated areas and night operation of drones. Hands-on experience with full-sized drones will give officers the confidence and ability to operate in a safe manner. Evidence collections in both photo and video format will be addressed, as well as the legal aspects of how to handle and store this information, as it differs from standard photo/video collection rules.~~

~~Finally, the Freedom from Drone Surveillance Act, ILCS 725/167 will be discussed to provide officers and their departments with a clear understanding about operating drones within the confines of the law, including the mandate to inform the State about maintenance and flight operations. Upon completion of this course, attendees will possess the knowledge to successfully take and pass their Part 107 FAA pilot's exam to become a licensed pilot. They will also be able to assist in creating proper departmental policies and procedures for operating drones.~~

~~**Course Objectives:** Identify the following: All state and federal laws pertaining to Small Unmanned Aircraft Systems (sUAS); different types of airspace; weather and weather-related conditions including cloud formations, types of fog, and wind conditions and how they play a role in the flight of a sUAS; loading and performance factors; airport and airfield standards, including left traffic patterns, METARS, TAFs, sectional charts, longitude and latitude; crew resource management, including types of attitudes, visual observers, Remote Pic, and the effects of drugs and alcohol; radio communication including 2.4 and 5 GHz, AWOS, ASOS, licensed frequencies, and CTAF; Emergency, Lost Link, and Flyaway procedures; launch and recovery; and Plan B and C.~~

~~✓ Perform the procedures for: Vertical takeoff and landing, basic flight maneuvers, recording video, taking still images, autonomous flights, pre-flight and maintenance, equipment replacement, record keeping, pre and post flight inspection, and logbook maintenance.~~

This Act requires all agencies employing law enforcement officers who conduct sexual assault and abuse investigations be required to provide specialized training within 2 years (January 1, 2019) of the effective date of this act. The act also requires that agencies present training to all law enforcement officers who are initial responders within 3 years (January 1, 2020) of the effective date of this act.

Course Description: This workshop is designed for the officer assigned to investigate/process crime scenes and will provide them with the needed skills to operate their department issued camera equipment to correctly photographically document evidence at a crime scene. Upon completion of this workshop officers will have learned how to operate their department issued cameras in normal and low light environments along with taking examination quality photographs of evidence.

Course Goals: By the end of this workshop, officers will be able to do the following:

- Will understand how depth of field affects crime scene photography.
- Will be able to produce the three types of crime scene photographs, orientation, reference, and identification with their department issued equipment

BUILDING A BETTER POLICE REPORT

Course Description:

This 8- hour course will focus on enhancing an officer's report writing skills so that he or she may better submit clear, accurate, concise, and detailed primary case reports. Emphasis will be placed on detailing probable cause for an arrest, better providing investigators with essentials in primary reports so that follow-up may become more efficient and enhancing case building in a way that will aid prosecutorial success. The course will examine some of the top failure points of poorly written reports as seen by shift supervisors, and then provide a blueprint to organization to better build reports for the future. Added emphasis will be placed on the additional care and challenges presented when preparing initial reports for Domestic Violence, Criminal Sexual Assault, and when an officer has had to apply physical force in the field. This course is geared to both newer patrol officer who may be developing report writing experience, as well as those veteran officers who might benefit from enhancing their report writing skills. Learning will be done through both lecture and a practical writing lab. Students are encouraged to bring a laptop computer with Microsoft Word installed.

Topics to be discussed:

- Developing a winning mindset for proper report writing- Why it is THAT important!
- Top areas of report failure and how to correct them before you commit them
- Eliminating the "Cliffhangers" and communicating to your overall audience (cops, courts, lawyers, and social services)
- Implementing a fool-proof "Blueprint" for organizing any report, every time
- Making the link from describing events to establishing why actions were taken
- Strategy for reviewing reports prior to submitting them
- Challenges in preparing a primary Domestic Violence Report
- Challenges in preparing a primary Sexual Assault Report
- Documenting your use of force within your report

Instructor: Sergeant Phelan is a 22- year veteran of the Lockport Police Department, and a patrol Sergeant for the last 9. He graduated from the University of Illinois- Chicago earning a BA in Criminal Justice. He is also a graduate of the NUCPS School of Staff and Command. In addition to his formal education, he has served his department by managing the crime prevention/community outreach program

where he was responsible for DARE, GREAT, community outreach, as well as writing and implementing a curriculum for his department's Citizen's Police Academy. (CONTINUED)

He was also the primary grant writer for Lockport in obtaining the Bureau of Justice Assistance's (BJA) Gang Resistance Education Grant, COPS Hiring Grant, Illinois Tobacco Enforcement Reimbursement Grant, and the Illinois Department of Transportation's Traffic Safety Grant. Those roles included the added responsibility of submitting grant proposals, timely progress reports, and preparing follow-up press-releases. He currently is the department's Field Training Manager where he is responsible for assisting in the selection of FTOs and reviewing the overall progress of recruits through the daily submitted observation reports.

Course Description: This 16-hour train-the-trainer program is designed to instruct officers in the legal, policy, and tactical issues related to the lawful and justifiable use of force in the course of police duties. This program will cover mandated State of Illinois use of force objectives and expand upon them.

Human performance science related to high stress response will be studied so that students might better understand how and why officers respond and make high-speed decisions during critical incidents.

Review of applicable federal and state statutes, case law, and policies will provide student officers with the knowledge needed to return to their respective agencies and develop effective courses of on-going study and instruction for all officers as required by the Police and Community Relations Improvement Act and ILETSB policy regarding the certification of in-house use of force training programs.

Other use of force-related topics to be covered in this program include:

- Procedural justice, de-escalation, disengagement, tactical patience, and perception challenges
- Human performance as it relates to force use and judgement, including time framing, time to start/time to stop, perseveration, visual narrowing, inattention blindness, and memory challenges in violent events
- Pre-event preparation issues, including an overview of "Left of Bang" concepts & behavior analysis
- Force documentation, articulation, and the importance of story-telling techniques to accurately describe behavior (CONTINUED)

Students will be provided with study guide / handout materials and no cost access to a DropBox online library of pertinent legal decision, articles, policies, and videos so they can develop training programs for their individual agencies.

Jeff Chudwin served with the Olympia Fields Police Department and retired as Chief of Police. He has been a law enforcement officer since 1974 and continues as a sworn officer with the Peotone IL Police Department. After graduating from DePaul University law school, he served as an Assistant States Attorney for both Will and Cook Counties IL. Chief Chudwin is a founding member and president of the Illinois Tactical Officers Association (ITOA). Since 1978, Chief Chudwin has provided training to police officers and agencies on legal and practical issues of police use of force and tactical response training through the state MTUs and at conferences throughout the country. He has worked on legal and policy issues related to officer involved shootings and represented and assisted officers involved in high-level use of force incidents. He is the executive editor of the ITOA Journal and has authored numerous articles for law enforcement publications on the issues of police use of force, firearms training, and SWAT and patrol functions.

Bernard Hogancamp is a retired 40-year veteran of the Homewood (IL) Police Department, having served in most operational positions throughout his career. More than half of his 30-year full-time career was in various command positions retiring as the watch commander of the 3rd watch. He currently serves as a part-time police officer/training specialist for the Blue Island, Olympia Fields, Wilmington, and Justice Police Departments. He is a 1995 graduate of the *Northwestern University of School Police Staff and Command* and holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Chicago State University. He has extensive experience as an instructor in a variety of areas for law enforcement, community groups and college students. He has also instructed a variety of state-certified courses including several that he has developed. These include Tactical Ground-fighting, Foundational Defensive Tactics, Police Cyclist Certification, Mountain Bike Maintenance, Simulator Master Instructor Trainer, *PowerPoint*, Ballistic Shield for Patrol Officers, Report Writing, Use of Force Reporting, and *Modern Warrior* Tactical Baton Instructor. He also completed the *Force Science Institute* analyst certification, co-developed a two-part Serious Force Investigations and Psychology of Violent Encounters and Use of Force Instructor classes. Course Description: This two-day course is specifically designed for experienced/trained/certified Field Training Officers. This in-service training will 1) provide update to the revised Daily Observation Report and the newly revised Standard Evaluation Guidelines, 2) updated Field Training and Evaluation Process boilerplate protocols and 3) instruction on Breaking Routine™ protocols utilizing with emphasis on training and coaching non-compromised job performance required for solo assignment certification.

This update instruction emphasizes the Field Training Officer's responsibilities to:

- Examine and objectively document probationer job behaviors and actions utilizing totally revised standardized assessment guidelines, and
- Analyze the probationer's training and performance needs and utilize the most appropriate instructional techniques for corrective action.

The instruction presentation will focus upon discussion as well as hands-on application of the course materials in small group and individual student exercises. Course content will include:

- ➡ Performance assessment components utilizing a non-numerical evaluation scale.
- ➡ Utilization of the revised Standardized Evaluation Guidelines.
- ➡ Legally/objectively documenting probationer performance.
- ➡ Utilizing a variety of on-the-job instructional/coaching techniques.
- ➡ Engaging the Probationer with Coaching Conversation protocols.
- ➡ Documenting training/coaching when Corrective Action is required
- ➡ Objectively determining when the Probationer is Not Responding to Training.
- ➡ Executing the revised Self-Initiated Field Activity protocols with the DTP — Daily Patrol Plan protocols.
- ➡ Strategies to assist the Not Responding to Training (NRT) Probationer.

Special attention: *Students should be familiar with their Department's Field Training and Evaluation Process and bring a copy of the agency's current Probationary Officer/Deputy Manual and assessment forms to the class. Students must be ready to roll up their sleeves to work on applying the revised protocols!*

PURPOSE OF COURSE: This four-day, 32-hour program has been designed by expert practitioners from the fields of juvenile law, social work, and law enforcement to assist recently assigned juvenile officers in the legal, moral, and social issues that they will encounter in their positions as juvenile specialists. Public Act 88-7 requires "Juvenile Officers" to complete a course as prescribed by the Board. This course meets that requirement.

COURSE OVERVIEW: The focus of this course is primarily to provide police officers with the skills, knowledge, and abilities needed to perform their duties as juvenile officers. In this unique role, juvenile officers not only enforce laws, but also respond compassionately and effectively to family problems. 5. Categorize the basic functions of the nervous system and stress response.
6. Conclude the missing skill set in Law Enforcement training.

The information developed through use of the standard investigative questions of "who," "what," "when" and "how" is often not adequate — even in combination with physical evidence — to identify the wrongdoer. The CIT training program is an in depth, specialized course for officers with at least two years' experience. The five day course includes presentations by behavioral health specialists, experienced field officers and representatives from regional service providers. Officers will receive training in topics such as mental illness/signs and symptoms, co-occurring disorders, child and adolescent issues, medical conditions and psychotropic medications, and law enforcement response and legal issues. They will also learn advanced communication and de-escalation techniques, partake in valuable exercises, have a unique opportunity to participate in discussions with individuals who have a mental illness and or their family members and given an opportunity to exercise their skills in realistic scenario role plays.

The key components of this course cover the following:

- Officers are exposed to the dynamics of mental illness, developmental disabilities, child and adolescent disorders, elderly individuals with behavioral issues, returning combat veterans, people who have excited delirium, and people with substance abuse/co-occurring disorders. This training will allow officers to make quick and effective decisions utilizing options they have to resolve the crisis.
- Officers are exposed to the experiences, viewpoints and concerns of persons with mental illnesses (consumers). Officers will meet with consumers in order to gain their perspective and learn from them.
- Officers receive instruction and demonstrations in basic listening and responding skills along with crisis interventions strategies. Course Description: The two-day WZ Seminar on Tactical Field Interviewing is designed to teach and reinforce the sound fundamentals of the field interviewing process for the patrol officer, field investigator, detective, police officer, special agent, or other law enforcement professional. Course participants learn a broad range of cutting-edge methods and proprietary tools to conduct more effective interviews and interrogations in their terrorism-related investigations that will result in more actionable intelligence, quicker admissions and better statements.

The course is especially appropriate for those investigators tasked with the investigation of domestic or foreign terrorism and terrorist-related activities. Criminal activities traditionally investigated by law enforcement may have provided cover and funding for terrorist organization in the United States and abroad. Instruction includes a comprehensive overview of non-confrontational interviewing methods to overcome the resistance of a traditional criminal or terrorist operative. Attendees will learn to assess verbal and non-verbal behavior, offer rationalizations, handle denials, detect deception and evaluate truthfulness. This course will enhance communication, interview and interrogation skills for a more focused and successful investigation of terrorist activities.

TOPICS INCLUDE:

- **Interview vs. Interrogation** and the advantages and disadvantages during a field contact or crime scene investigation.
- **Legal Aspects of Tactical Field Interviews:** A review of the laws regarding criminal interview and interrogation, Miranda warnings, consent to search, and the development of an admission into a legally acceptable confession.
- **Counter-Terrorism Interdiction Questioning:** Questioning techniques that can be utilized during a tactical interview of a potential terrorist suspect. Baseline and behavior-provoking questions discussed.

Tactical De-Escalation of Non-Violent Confrontations Through Verbal Skills and Body Language

(A Legitimacy and Procedural Justice and Terrorism Behavior Identification Interactive, Scenario Based Training)

Course Description:

Recent events have placed police officers and the public they serve in the national spotlight in the news, on the internet, and in Federal and local court. These events usually start as encounters for minor traffic stops, petty ordinance violations, or disorderly conduct-based confrontations. Many of these non-arrest situations quickly escalate to physical, violent, and sometimes deadly force encounters. While the officers involved are acting properly and legally enforcing the laws they are sworn to uphold, day after judgments quickly become the focus.

This one-day seminar will help departments reduce citizen complaints based on perceived improper use of force incidents. Attendees will improve their verbal communication skills and recognize when an emotion-based rather than emotionally disability escalation is occurring. Officers will learn to explore alternative methods of safely and peacefully bringing a resolution to both the issue at hand and the reason for the encounter. This seminar will focus on everyday encounters with non-mentally impaired or disturbed individuals who are upset or agitated and may escalate the encounter based on anger issues and behavior. Officers will examine how to maintain scene and individual safety, and follow accepted personnel safety protocols. Participants will actively participate as both officers **and** subjects/offenders in some of the scenarios. This class is appropriate for CIT trained Officers, Patrol Officers, and Supervisors.

ATTENDEE COURSE GOALS:

- Learn the difference between confrontation and response/conversation.
- Learn how to use disarming and de-escalation phraseology with subjects.
- Learn what inflammatory phraseology is and how to avoid it.
- Understand the difference between deflecting and accusing during encounters.
- Identify how and when perception from a distance can be interpreted.
- Learn to identify physiological cues and tells of subjects escalating to a physical response.
- Understand how body chemistry works (endorphins, adrenalin and dopamine, etc.).
- Review how to reduce negative public perception during encounters.
- Learn how to secure a scene for responder and public safety during encounters.
- Learn how to avoid purposeful escalation and negative public perception.
- Recognize physical tells of cluster behavior in incident escalation.
- Identify situations which may relate to domestic terrorism activities.

This class will may employ air soft and non-lethal weapons. Officers will need to bring their duty belts and are encouraged to have either sweatshirts or long sleeve shirts available to wear.

The lead instructors are Michael Drumm and Rick Emerson. Both are certified, full-time police officers, and are members of the ITOA and the International Law Enforcement Educators and Trainers Association. Drumm and Emerson are CIT trained; both teach conflict communication skills and street interview skills.
