Course Description: This 16-hour train-the-trainer program is designed to instruct officers in the legal, policy, and tactical issues related to the lawful and justifiable use of force in the course of police duties. This program will cover mandated State of Illinois use of force objectives and expand upon them.

Human performance science related to high stress response will be studied so that students might better understand how and why officers respond and make high-speed decisions during critical incidents.

Review of applicable federal and state statutes, case law, and policies will provide student officers with the knowledge needed to return to their respective agencies and develop effective courses of on-going study and instruction for all officers as required by the Police and Community Relations Improvement Act and ILETSB policy regarding the certification of in-house use of force training programs.

Other use of force-related topics to be covered in this program include:

- Procedural justice, de-escalation, disengagement, tactical patience, and perception challenges
- Human performance as it relates to force use and judgement, including time framing, time to start/time to stop, perseveration, visual narrowing, inattention blindness, and memory challenges in violent events
- Pre-event preparation issues, including an overview of "Left of Bang" concepts & behavior analysis
- Force documentation, articulation, and the importance of story-telling techniques to accurately describe behavior (CONTINUED)

Students will be provided with study guide / handout materials and no cost access to a DropBox online library of pertinent legal decision, articles, policies, and videos so they can develop training programs for their individual agencies.

Instructors:

Jeff Chudwin served with the Olympia Fields Police Department and retired as Chief of Police He has been a law enforcement officer since 1974 and continues as a sworn officer with the Peotone IL Police Department. After graduating from DePaul University law school, he served as an Assistant States Attorney for both Will and Cook Counties IL. Chief Chudwin is a founding member and president of the Illinois Tactical Officers Association (ITOA). He is a founding member and for ten years served as cochairman of ILEAS Region 4, the statewide law enforcement mutual aid system including Cook, DuPage and Lake Counties. (Continued) Since 1978, Chief Chudwin has provided training to police officers and agencies on legal and practical issues of police use of force and tactical response training through the state MTUs and at conferences throughout the country. He has worked on legal and policy issues related to officer involved shootings and represented and assisted officers involved in high-level use of force incidents. He is the executive editor of the ITOA Journal and has authored numerous articles for law enforcement publications on the issues of police use of force, firearms training, and SWAT and patrol functions.

Bernard Hogancamp is a retired 40-year veteran of the Homewood (IL) Police Department, having served in most operational positions throughout his career. More than half of his 30-year full-time career was in various command positions retiring as the watch commander of the 3rd watch. He currently serves as a part-time police officer/training specialist for the Blue Island, Olympia Fields, Wilmington, and Justice Police Departments. He is a 1995 graduate of the *Northwestern University of School Police Staff and Command* and holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Chicago State University. He has extensive experience as an instructor in a variety of areas for law enforcement, community groups and college students. He has also instructed a variety of state-certified courses including several that he has developed. These include Tactical Ground-fighting, Foundational Defensive Tactics, Police Cyclist Certification, Mountain Bike Maintenance, Simulator Master Instructor Trainer, *PowerPoint*, Ballistic Shield for Patrol Officers, Report Writing, Use of Force Reporting, and *Modern Warrior* Tactical Baton Instructor. He also completed the *Force Science Institute* analyst certification, co-developed a two-part Serious Force Investigations and Psychology of Violent Encounters and Use of Force Instructor classes. Bernard Hogancamp has been invited to lecture at professional conferences for the *International Law Enforcement Trainers and Educators Association (ILEETA)*, *Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police Expo (IACP)*, and the *International Police Mountain Bike Association (IPMBA)*. He recently retired as president of *IPMBA* after serving on the Board of Directors for nine years. From 2006 to 2016, he was an adjunct instructor and course developer for the Institute for Legal Studies Department at *Northwestern College*, teaching undergraduate criminal justice courses in the classroom and on-line. Since retiring from full-time law enforcement, he has worked the past ten years in security operations for the United Center and Guaranteed Rate Field and is currently the event security manager, responsible for hiring, training, scheduling, and gate operations for all events at both venues.

Course Description: This two-day course is specifically designed for experienced/trained/certified Field Training Officers. This in-service training will 1) provide update to the revised Daily Observation Report and the newly revised Standard Evaluation Guidelines, 2) updated Field Training and Evaluation Process boilerplate protocols and 3) instruction on Breaking Routine™ protocols utilizing with emphasis on training and coaching non-compromised job performance required for solo assignment certification.

This update instruction emphasizes the Field Training Officer's responsibilities to:

- Examine and objectively document probationer job behaviors and actions utilizing totally revised standardized assessment guidelines, and
- Analyze the probationer's training and performance needs and utilize the most appropriate instructional techniques for corrective action.

The instruction presentation will focus upon discussion as well as hands-on application of the course materials in small group and individual student exercises. Course content will include:

- ➡ Performance assessment components utilizing a non-numerical evaluation scale.
- ➡ Utilization of the revised Standardized Evaluation Guidelines.
- ➡ Legally/objectively documenting probationer performance.
- ➡ Utilizing a variety of on-the-job instructional/coaching techniques.
- ➡ Engaging the Probationer with Coaching Conversation protocols.
- ➡ Documenting training/coaching when Corrective Action is required
- ➡ Objectively determining when the Probationer is Not Responding to Training.
- ➡ Executing the revised Self-Initiated Field Activity protocols with the DTP — Daily Patrol Plan protocols.
- ➡ Strategies to assist the Not Responding to Training (NRT) Probationer.

Special attention: *Students should be familiar with their Department's Field Training and Evaluation Process and bring a copy of the agency's current Probationary Officer/Deputy Manual and assessment forms to the class. Students must be ready to roll up their sleeves to work on applying the revised protocols!*

32 Hour Juvenile Specialist Skills Program

Frankfort Police Department

PENDING

PURPOSE OF COURSE: This four-day, 32-hour program has been designed by expert practitioners from the fields of juvenile law, social work, and law enforcement to assist recently assigned juvenile officers in the legal, moral, and social issues that they will encounter in their positions as juvenile specialists. Public Act 88-7 requires "Juvenile Officers" to complete a course as prescribed by the Board. This course meets that requirement.

COURSE OVERVIEW: The focus of this course is primarily to provide police officers with the skills, knowledge, and abilities needed to perform their duties as juvenile officers. In this unique role, juvenile officers not only enforce laws, but also respond compassionately and effectively to family problems. They serve as protectors of society by investigating criminal acts for findings of delinquency and as supporters of youths by helping them to grow out of adolescence without experiencing the stigma of police involvement.

Specific topics to be addressed in this program include the following:

- The role and responsibility of the Juvenile Officer
- Gaining perspectives on the assignment
- Child development
- Child psychology
- Communicating with adolescents and parents
- Adolescents and electronic influences
- Intervention and prevention strategies
- Article I of the Juvenile Court Act: General provisions
- Article II of the Juvenile Court Act: Abused, neglected, and dependent minors
- Article III of the Juvenile Court Act: Minors requiring authoritative intervention
- Article IV of the Juvenile Court Act: Addicted Minors
- Article V of the Juvenile Court Act: Delinquent minors
- Psychodynamics of child abuse
- The role of law enforcement and social services
- Protective custody
- Investigative techniques
- Preparing child abuse cases for court
- Sexual abuse and sexual exploitation investigations

COURSE GOALS: The goals of this course are to make officers particularly aware of the demographics of the burgeoning youth population, which is becoming increasingly more vulnerable to gang recruitment, violent crime, sexual exploitation, alcohol, and drug abuse, and carrying weapons. Officers will become uniquely aware of these problems and the needs facing the children, adolescents, young adults, and parents that they will be serving in their capacity as juvenile officers. Throughout the program, participation in supportive networks such as Juvenile Officer Associations, Gang Task Forces, and high school liaison programs will be discussed and encouraged.

Course Description: Law Enforcement Personnel will learn the skills needed to conduct internet-based investigations. Students will learn about the current publicly available Open Source Intelligence Techniques (OSINT) that can be used in intelligence gathering will be discussed. Law Enforcement Officers will gain valuable insight in learning new ways to gather intelligence from public or open sources available without the need for subpoenas or search warrants.

Topics Include:

- Current open-source websites where intelligence can be gathered
- Creating social media/online identities to hide your identity
- Social Media Investigations
- Advanced Google Searches
- Dark Web Investigations
- Internet Protocol

Officers must bring a computer with internet capabilities and a USB Port.

Legal & Justifiable Use of Force

PENDING

Course Description: This course will focus on police officer use of force considerations in on-duty and off-duty scenarios. Practical use of force issues will be examined by viewing actual videos from live police use of force encounters and discussing the officer's decisions in those instances. The course will review U.S. Supreme Court cases, Federal Court decisions, Illinois statutes and case law, and what our courts specifically look for in police use of force situations. The course will also address use of force occurrences, ranging from crimes in progress to the use of force in medical emergencies. The material will consider use of force from an officer's perspective: pre-assault indicators, force options that may be utilized, the use of intermediate weapons, permitted uses of force, prohibited uses of force, and the deadly use of force. Instruction will include proper documentation, Qualified Immunity, Garrity issues, and the Illinois Uniform Peace Officer's Disciplinary Act. The program will conclude with a discussion of the "10 Myths of Police Use of Force."

Topics Discussed:

- Video analysis of actual police use of force events and decision making
- Use of force during crimes in progress; offenders fleeing a crime scene; medical emergencies
- Use of force where offender is neither evading arrest nor committing a crime
- Review of Illinois, Federal, and U.S. Supreme Court cases regarding police use of force
- What our courts consider when evaluating an officer's use of force
- Pre-assault indicators; force options; quantum of force; use of intermediate weapons
- Acceptable methods of force; unacceptable methods of force; use of deadly force
- Documenting an officer's use of force
- Probable cause and Qualified Immunity; Garrity issues
- The Illinois Uniform Peace Officer's Disciplinary Act
- "The 10 Myths of Police Use of Force"

Instructor: Jeffrey J. Pavletic is an award-winning trial attorney who has built a reputation of integrity and exceptional skill in the courtroom. As a prosecutor for the past two decades, he has tried countless cases to victory (including approximately 150 jury trials with a concentration in homicide and violent crime). In addition to trying some of the highest profile and complex cases that have occurred in the history of Northern Illinois, Jeff was Chief of the Felony Review Division, and is currently the First Assistant State's Attorney for the Lake County (Illinois) State's Attorney's Office. I LETSB School Resource Officer Training by Butts

Plainfield Police Department

This course complies with the guidelines of the following mandate(s): PENDING

Course Description: This 5-day, 40 hour program has been designed by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board to provide students with the required training in use of police personnel within the school setting in accordance with SB 2925 (PA 100-984). SROs must be police officers of law enforcement agencies who are to serve within a school setting pursuant to a memorandum of understanding between the employing law enforcement agency and a school district within the agency's jurisdiction. Any officer serving in this role as of January 1, 2021 must have a special certification issued by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board ("Board"). Such officers must have attended a special training, or attained a waiver by the Board, before they can serve in this role. **To be eligible for this special certificate, a full-time Illinois law enforcement officer must have been actively employed in a law enforcement position within the state for at least three years (five years for part-time officers) before enrolling in the course or requesting a waiver. Each such officer must also be of sound character, free of disciplinary concerns, and open to working with minors.**

Topics Discussed:

Overview of juvenile law, Juvenile Court Act, role of the juvenile officer, special juvenile considerations, due process for juveniles, detention of juveniles, interrogating juvenile suspects, interviewing juvenile witnesses, rights of parents, SRO introduction, roles of SRO, school structure and hierarchy, school law, adolescent development/teen brain, communication, developing relationships among diverse students, special considerations and disabilities, criminal activity, law enforcement actions in school, ethical concerns, school design and safety, introduction to school threat response, school threat response case studies, role of SRO during a threat, recognizing an active threat, tactical maneuvering on school grounds, solo vs. group response tactics, clearing of school classrooms, identification and response to threat, post event, scenario trainings.

Instructors: This course will be taught by a team of Instructors. Lead Instructor, Danielle Butts is the Founder and Executive Director of All Our Children's Advocacy Center. She has been a Forensic Interviewer for 20 years and conducted over 4,000 interviews. Danielle is a member of the Cook County Child Abuse Advisory Board and the Children's Advocacy Center of Illinois Legislative Committee. She has been a law enforcement instructor for over 15 years and currently teaches; Interviewing Children, Juvenile Investigations, Sexual Assault and SRO.
